

UNT College of Law in Downtown Dallas

DFW is the largest metropolitan region in the United States without a public law school

- DFW has private law schools at SMU and Texas Wesleyan, but none public.
- While Houston has three law schools (2 public, 1 private) and annually seats 2,800 law students, the more populated DFW region seats only 1,200 students (at its 2 private law schools).
- There are five <u>private</u> (SMU, Dallas; Baylor, Waco; St. Mary's, San Antonio; South Texas, Houston; and Texas Wesleyan, Fort Worth) and four <u>public</u> law schools (UT, Austin; Texas Tech, Lubbock; University of Houston and Texas Southern, Houston) in Texas.

DFW has the largest, most educated population in Texas

- Since 1990, DFW's population has increased from 4 to 5.6 million, while the number of those with a bachelor's degree has increased from over 400,000 to over 700,000.

The needs of DFW demand an affordable opportunity in legal education

- Average Texas private law school tuition (\$19,000) is almost three times the average Texas public law school tuition (\$6,600).
- Annual student loans at private law schools in Texas (\$21,500) are almost 30% higher than the average public law school loans
