CB Role/Responsibilities



- ▶ Created by the Texas Legislature in 1965 to provide leadership and coordination for the Texas higher education system to achieve excellence for the college education of Texas students.
- ▶ Statutory responsibilities in the Texas Education Code, Title 3, Section 61.
- ▶ Ten-member Board, nine members serve six-year staggered terms, and one student member serves one-year term. Chair and Vice-Chair appointed by the Governor.
- ▶ Board meets quarterly in Jan, April, July, Oct

CB Responsibilities



- ▶ State's higher education plan, *Closing the Gaps by 2015*
- ▶ Reviews and recommend changes in formula funding
- ▶ Responds to requests for new academic programs
- ▶ Conducts studies and make recommendations on achieving excellence in or improving higher education
- ▶ Approves new construction, renovations, and property acquisitions funded with state money at public institutions of higher education
- ▶ Administers the state's student financial aid programs, including the Toward EXcellence, Access, & Success (TEXAS) Grant Program, the Texas B-On-Time Student Loan Program, and the Hinson-Hazlewood College Student Loan Program
- ▶ Approves degree programs at career colleges and regulate unaccredited private postsecondary institutions
- ▶ Collects and report data on higher education

Higher Ed Institutions

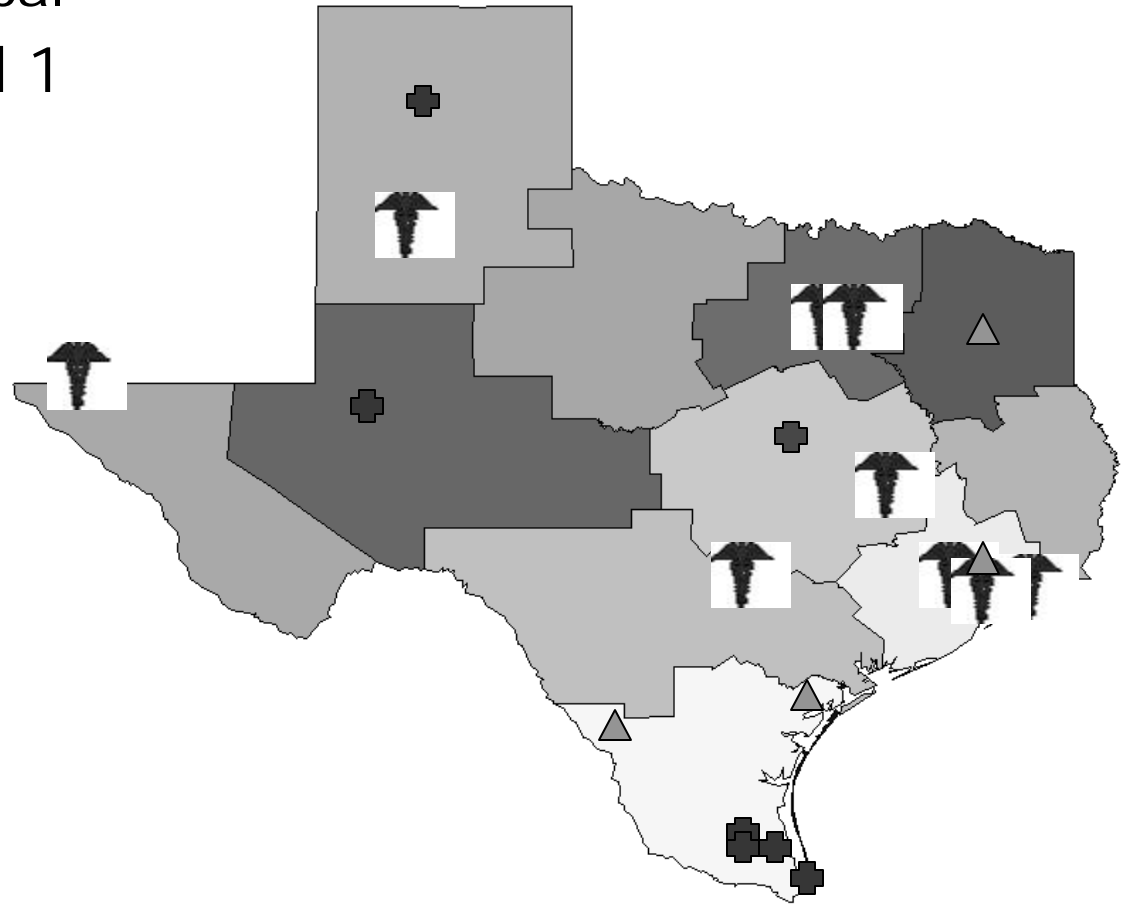


- ▶ 148 public and independent institutions of higher education
- ▶ Public institutions
 - ? 104 total public higher education institutions
 - 38 public four-year universities and associated academic centers
 - three public state colleges
 - 50 public community college districts with multiple campuses; four public technical colleges
 - 9 public health-related institutions
- ▶ Independent institutions
 - ? 44 independent institutions
 - 39 independent universities
 - two junior colleges
 - one health-related institution
 - two chiropractic institutions

Health-Related Institutions



- ▶ Texas has 10 medical schools (9 public and 1 independent)
- ▶ Medical schools are located in large metropolitan areas
- ▶ Texas graduates 1,300 physicians annually



- ▲ Other Health-Related Institutions
- Regional Academic Health Centers

- ▶ Physicians – focused on primary care
 - ? Joint Admissions Medical Program

- ▶ Nurses – primarily focused on RN licensure
 - ? Professional Nursing Shortage Reduction Program
 - ? Hospital-Based Nursing Education Program
 - ? Nursing Innovation Grants
- ▶ Allied Health – no funding
 - ? Minority Health Research and Education Program

Physician Workforce



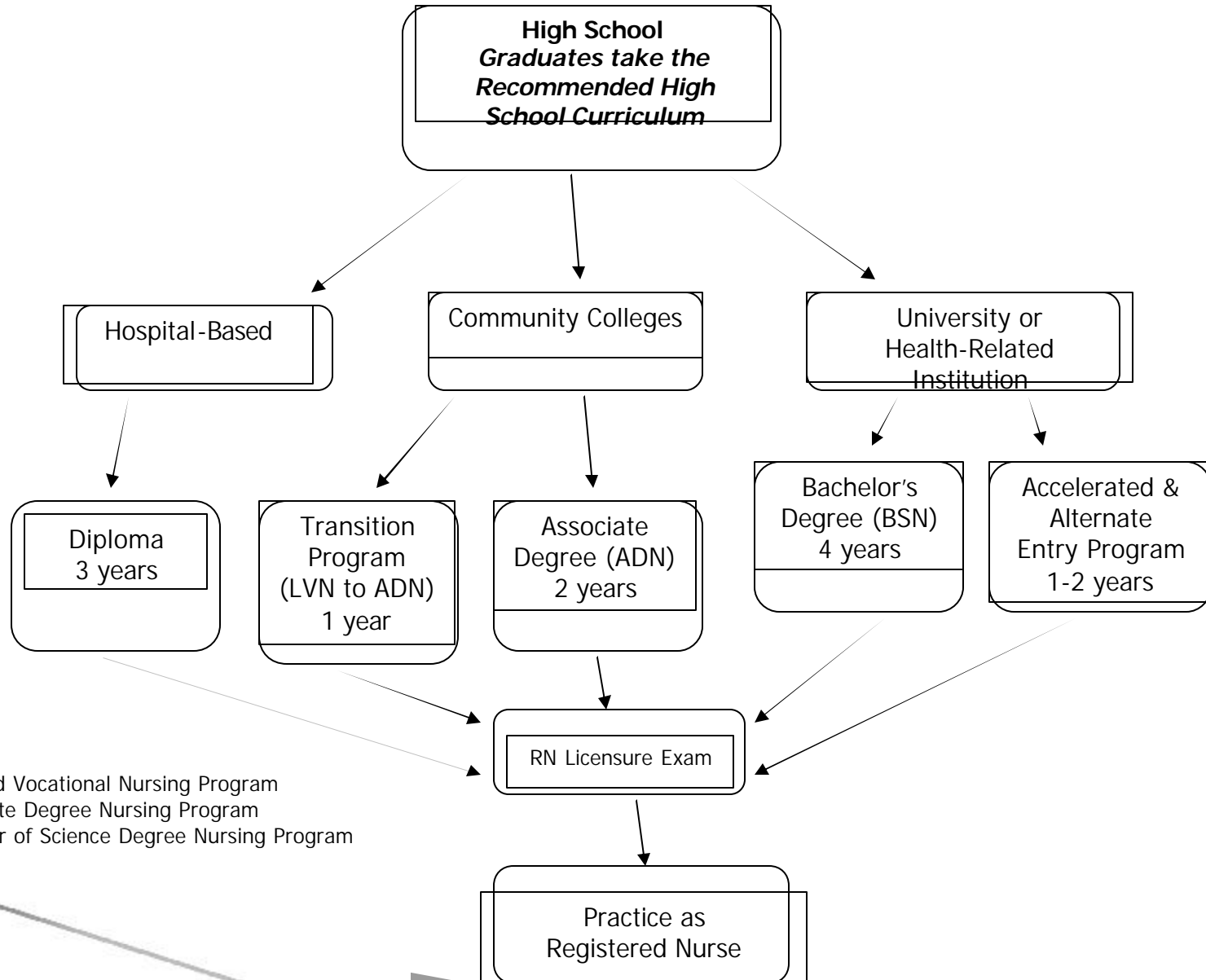
- ▶ State funding began in 1979
 - ? CB contracts with medical schools, hospitals, and foundations
 - ? CB funds targeted at producing more primary care physicians who will stay in Texas (aligned with *Closing the Gaps* and the original Task force on Health Professions)
- ▶ Funding levels
 - ? In FY 2002-03 state appropriations totaled \$57M and supported six programs
 - ? In 2004-05 funding reduced -- 2 programs not funded
 - ? In 2010-2011 funding was restored for the Family Practice Residency Program

Nursing Workforce

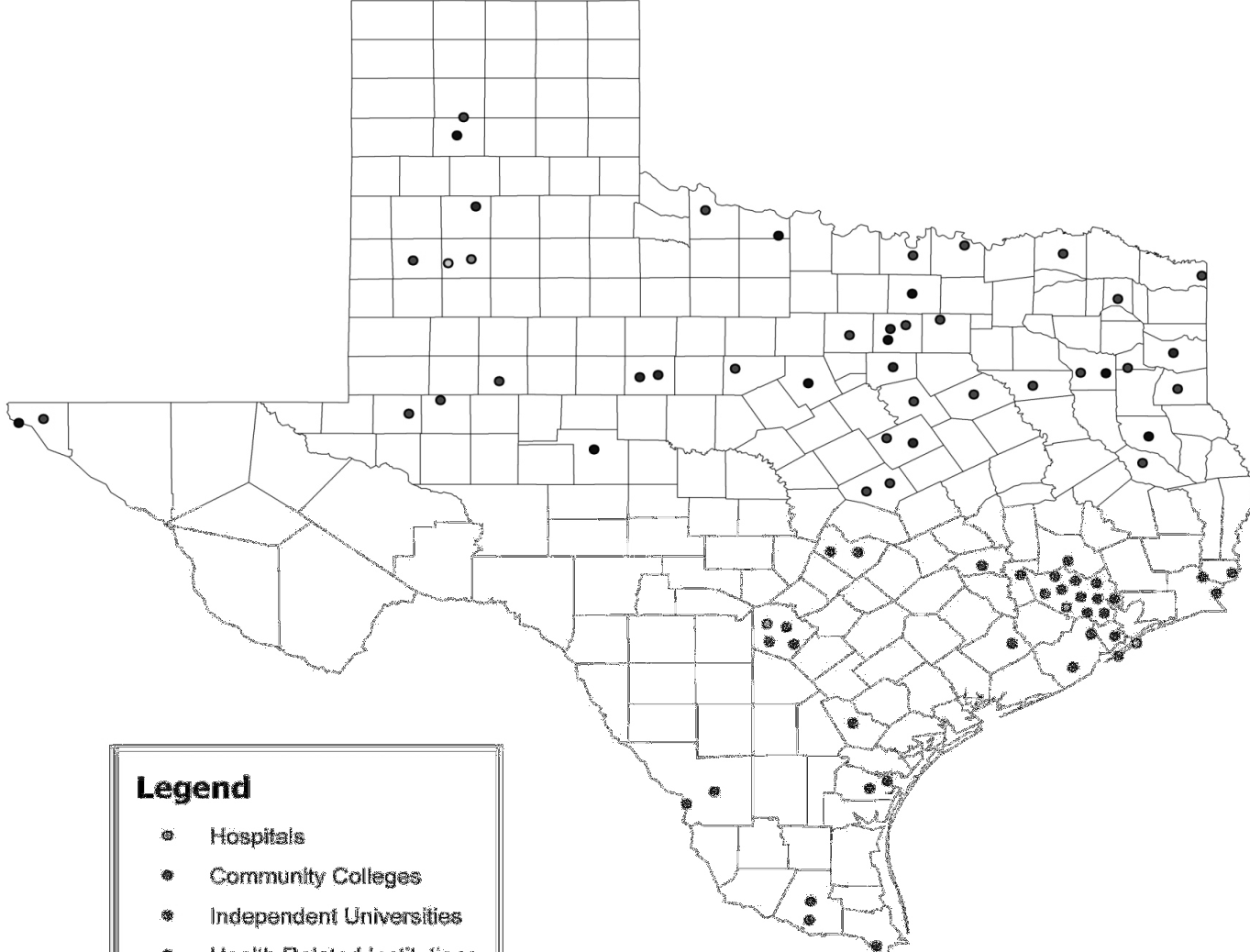


- ▶ Professional Nursing Shortage Reduction Program
- ▶ Hospital-Based Nursing Education Program
 - ? Created in 2007; Funded in 2009
 - ? Competitive Grant to support partnerships between higher education institutions and hospitals
 - ? Awards will be made in April (31 letters of intent received)
- ▶ Nursing Innovation Grant Program
 - ? Tobacco Settlement Proceeds
 - ? Competitions focus on using simulation-based instruction, non-traditional faculty, and "at risk" student tracking systems to increase student capacity and success
- ▶ Minority Health Research and Education Program
 - ? Recent competition sought new educational pipelines for Hispanic and African American students to enter allied health and initial licensure nursing programs

Legend

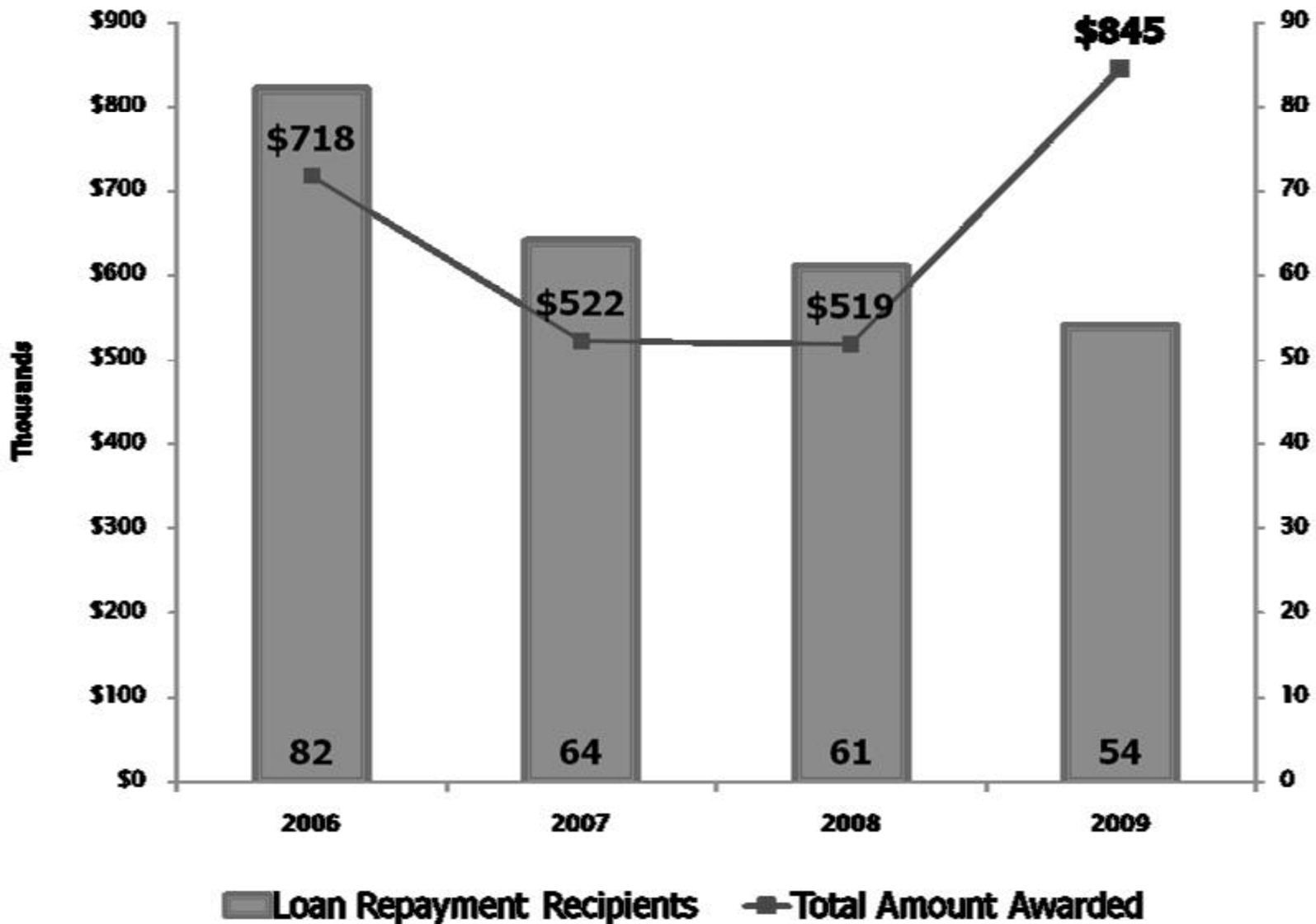

Loan Repayment Programs

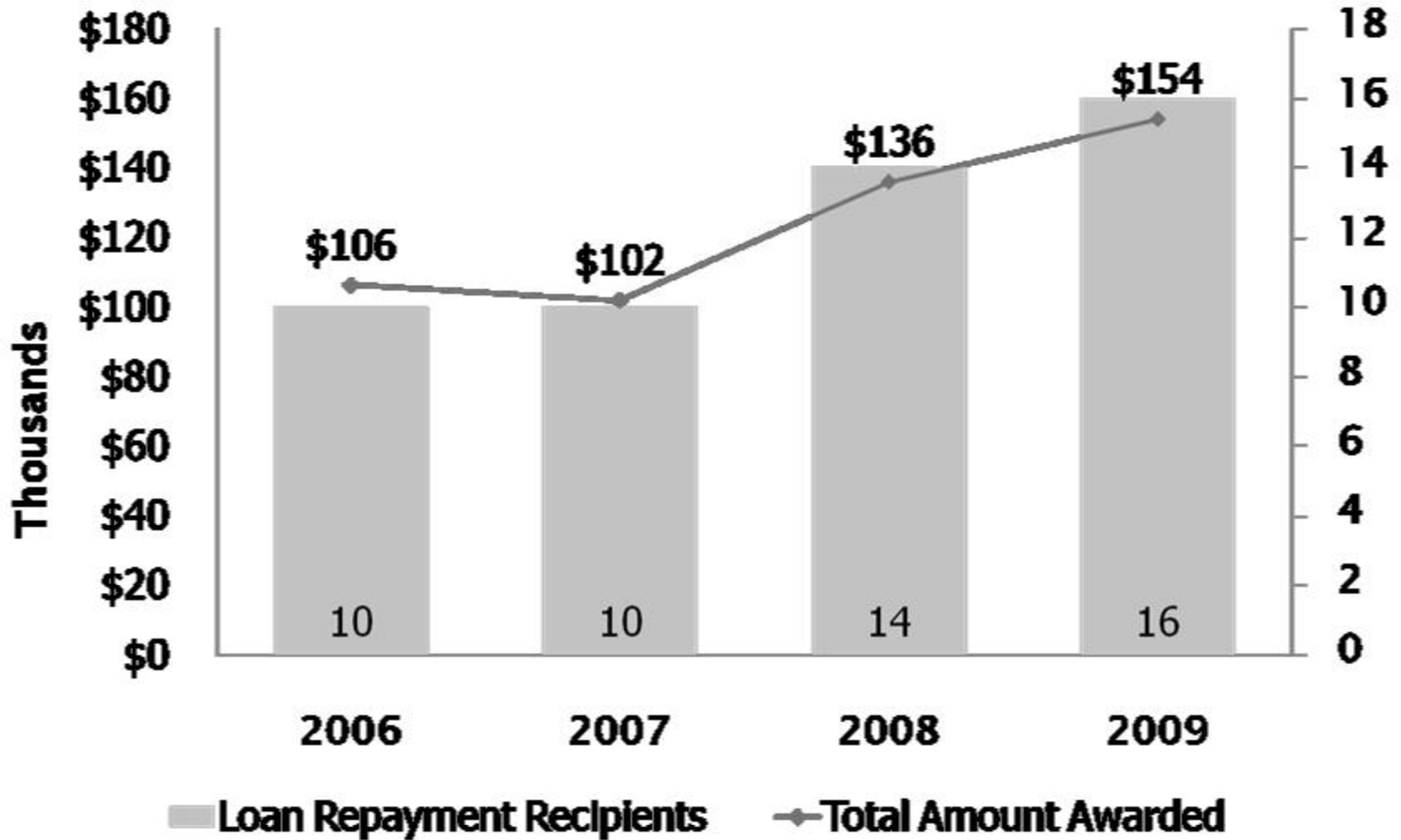


- ▶ Recently expanded participation w/DSHS
 - ? On line application system (cooperative agreement with DSHS)
 - ? Enhanced program marketing and participation monitoring
- ▶ Physician Education Loan Repayment Program
 - ? Oldest program -- began in late-1980s
 - ? Location/practice in Health Professional Shortage Area
 - ? Increased funding through restructuring tobacco tax
- ▶ Children's Medicaid Loan Repayment Program
 - ? Funding resulted from Frew v. Hawkins
 - ? Based on number of children's Medicaid patient visits
- ▶ Dental Education Loan Repayment Program
 - ? First award in 2000
 - ? Location/practice in Health Professional Shortage Area
