The Texas Legislature's **redistricting website** includes:

- general information about the redistricting process;
- general information about legal requirements relevant to redistricting;
- a section on the history of redistricting in Texas; and
- maps and reports on current house, senate, congressional, and SBOE districts.



It also provides links to announcements for house and senate redistricting hearings.

DistrictViewer provides detailed maps of current districts and will be the site to view all redistricting proposals submitted for legislative consideration.

Members of the public will be able to submit proposed district plans to the legislature once the 2020 Census data is available. Plans prepared by members of the public on free or commercially available software (for example, Maptitude, Public Mapping Project's District Builder, Esri Redistricting, Dave's Redistricting) may be provided to the legislature in a standard block equivalency file format (.txt or .csv) for inclusion in DistrictViewer, where they will be easily accessible for consideration or further modifications by legislators, the committees, and the public. Procedures for electronic submission of plans prepared by the public, such as by email, will be publicized after those procedures have been finalized.
